

## Want someone to do something (1)



Practise using the phrase "want someone to do something" as positive, negative sentence and question

When used in a positive statement form the sentence in this way: Person + want + object pronoun (me, you, him, her, us, them) + to infinitive.

In a negative sentence use it in this way: Person + don't/doesn't/didn't + want + object pronoun + to infinitive. In a question: Do/Does/Did + person + want + object pronoun + to infinitive.

1 Positive sentence example: I want him to explain the exercise. Negative sentence example: He doesn't want me to go the party.

Question example: Did your Mum want you to phone her?



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(Lucy wants her sister to help).
